The Foothill-De Anza Community College District Board of Trustees unanimously selected Dr. Miner to serve as president of Foothill College beginning July 1, 2007. She has worked as a higher education administrator since 1977 and in the California Community Colleges since 1979 when City College of San Francisco selected her as the dean of Admissions & Records. In the mid-1980s, she held two positions at the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office: special assistant to the vice chancellor for Student Services and program coordinator for the Transfer Center Pilot Program. Dr. Miner then served De Anza College for 18 years in a number of positions, including those of vice president of Instruction; interim president; provost of Arts, Letters & Social Sciences; dean of Academic Services; dean of Matriculation Services; and acting dean of Special Education.

Dr. Miner earned a.B.A., summa cum laude, in history and French as well as an M.A. in history at Lone Mountain College in San Francisco; and a doctorate in organization and leadership with a concentration in education law from the University of San Francisco.

Away from the campus, she loves opera and travel, preferably in combination as evidenced by trips to Santa Fe, Salzburg, Sydney and Stockholm to name just the cities starting with "S". An avowed bibliophile, she created the popular Foothill College Authors Series to share her passion for reading with students, faculty, staff and community members.




